## LIFE SKILL TARGET: PROFESSIONALISM

Professionalism does not mean wearing a suit or carrying a briefcase. It means conducting oneself with responsibility, integrity, accountability and excellence. It means communicating effectively and appropriately and always finding ways to be productive.

With summer fast approaching, more teens are looking for jobs. Summer jobs and internships are an excellent way for teens to learn new skills, make contacts and build resumes. They are also a great way to determine what jobs might interest youth in the future. One challenge for teens as they enter a new workplace is how to act in a professional or work environment. It is essential to teach youth that professional behavior is expected at the workplace.





## 10 TIPS FOR PROFESSIONALISM

APPEARANCE: Before your first day of work, know what to wear. Can you wear shorts or sandals, or is there a required uniform? It should be a priority for you to look neat and clean because you will be in a professional environment. Make sure you ask any questions about what to wear, how your hair should look, and even about piercings and tattoos.

BE ON TIME: Know when you are supposed to be at your job. If you are taking public transportation, ensure you know where the bus/train drops you off and if it will arrive and pick you up at the correct time. Ask questions about what you should do if you are late. Who should you call if you are going to be late? Is there a policy about being late? Will you be fired?

WATCH YOUR DEMANOR: Your demeanor is how you appear to other people. Summer jobs and internships give teens the opportunity to learn new skills and be exposed to new organizations and people they might not otherwise get to meet. You want to appear friendly, polite and well-spoken, especially when working in a customer service setting. Make sure your interactions with coworkers and supervisors are pleasant.

BE RELIABLE: Be where you say you will be and complete the tasks you say you will do. Your supervisor wants to be able to rely on you.

WATCH YOUR LANGUAGE: Remember to be careful what you say. Watch your language. Remember that you are not at school talking to your friends. Using slang or swearing does not translate well in the workplace.



## 10 TIPS FOR PROFESSIONALISM

PHONE ETIQUETTE: Be careful with your cell phones. Make sure you know the phone rules before you show up at work. Watch your texting, Snapchatting and picture-taking at work. Some of these activities could get you fired. Ask questions if you need clarification on the phone policy.

DON'T GOSSIP: Be careful what you say to and about your coworkers. Being friendly with the people you work with is excellent but be careful what you repeat. Don't start any rumors. Remember to remain professional.

DON'T OVERSHARE: The workplace is not the place to share your woes. Also, be careful about posting things about work, your supervisor or your coworkers on social media. Those posts do not disappear, and people will see them.

BE ORGANZIED: Know your schedule and arrange to be there with everything you need to succeed. Keep your workspace (if you have one) clean and organized.

OFFER TO HELP: Be willing to try new things and learn new skills. Get outside your comfort zone because this is how you will stretch and grow. The more things you try, the more marketable you are to future employers.

#### **Eligibility requirements**

- √ Minimum 18 years of age
- ✓Authorized to work in the United States
- √ Resides in Central Florida
- √ High School Diploma or GED required or proof of enrollment in a GED program
- ✓ Experienced financial instability (unemployment, low wages, government assistance, etc.) during the last 12 months
- √ No criminal history involving arson, sexual battery or violent crimes
- √ Willingness to commit to obtain a full-time job in the culinary industry upon completion of the program
- √ Must attend in-person classes for 16 weeks

As we approach the end of the school year, it's important to support students academically and emotionally. Caregivers play an invaluable role in helping students stay motivated and balanced during this time. Here are a few ways you can help your student finish strong.

#### **RECOGNIZE SIGNS OF BURNOUT**

Be on alert for changes in mood, sleep patterns, lack of motivation or appearing to be overwhelmed. These could be signs your student needs a break or extra support.

#### **CHECK IN DAILY**

Even a five-minute conversation about how their day went can help students feel seen, supported and heard.

#### **CREATE CONSISTENT ROUTINES**

Regular sleep schedules, healthy meals and dedicated time for homework can go a long way toward creating structure and reducing stress.

#### **PARTNER WITH ADVOCATES**

Your student's advocate is part of our education team and here to support both you and your student. Don't hesitate to reach out — whether you want to talk through concerns or celebrate progress. We're in this together!
