Brevard Parent Continues Building Family and Life Connections

Bonnie Ferguson, her husband, Ray, and their six biological children, have made a significant impact as a foster and adoptive family in Brevard County. In12 years, they have welcomed 32 children into their home – 25 were reunified with family, and seven joined the Fergusons' family forever through adoption. In 2022, Bonnie established **Equipped & Encouraged**, a nonprofit organization devoted to supporting foster and adoptive children and families through enhanced church and community engagement.



While the Fergusons' lives have been touched in many ways through the children and families they have served, one child stands out for her profound impact in their early years of fostering. Evelyn "Evie," whom the Fergusons adopted in July 2017, received a severe medical diagnosis with a life expectancy of 12 months soon after she was placed in their home in early 2015.

"Evie was such a tremendous blessing," said Bonnie, fighting back tears. "She passed

away in November 2017 after outliving her life expectancy three times over. She changed our lives in so many ways. Fostering and adopting a medically complex child wasn't part of our plan, but God knew that we needed her as much as she needed us."

After Evie's diagnosis, Bonnie had to complete training to be licensed as a medical foster parent, and she had to learn how to operate many complicated medical devices. "It was a little scary at first, but once you get past the initial fear, it simply becomes part of your routine."

Today, the Fergusons are parents to 13 children, saying it can be chaotic and, at times, difficult, but it is immensely rewarding. "Our children deal with the effects of relational trauma every day," she said. "It's important that we do all we can to help them develop healthy connections and heal."

Through her nonprofit, Bonnie is connecting local churches with foster families who need their support. She is currently working with 15 churches. "We'd like to make that 35," she says, "or 10 percent of the more than 350 churches in the county. 35 churches wrapping around and strengthening foster families could make a tremendous difference for the children in their care."

With the help of church and community partnerships, Equipped & Encouraged provides holistic care to foster and adoptive families. Services include church-hosted parent nights out, peer-to-peer support groups, trauma training for churches and organizations, family care packages, practical supplies, and Christmas giving. This fall, E&E is taking the lead on a funded fellowship awarded to Brevard County by the **Christian Alliance for Orphans**. This grant work will involve local churches and agencies in analyzing data gaps in foster care to enhance levels of assistance.

"There have been a lot of changes in foster parenting since I began in 2004," Bonnie says, "but the goal of helping children lead safe and fulfilling lives hasn't changed."

Fider Family Changes Lives Through Foster Parenting

Wendy Fider was 10 when she knew she wanted to help children who needed a temporary home or assistance. While hearing a community educator speak about foster parenting and remark that, "no one wakes up and wants to be a foster parent," Wendy knew something was very wrong with the statement. "I spoke up and told him, that's not true for me!"

She became a foster parent in 2017, achieving her lifetime dream. Her and her husband, Deuel, have gone on to care for seven permanent foster children, keeping them for approximately two years each until reunification with biological families. Last year, the Fiders adopted a child who they received from the hospital when he was 10 days old and who is now four.

The family lives in Palm Bay, Florida, where Deuel works as an engineer and coaches basketball at a local high school, while Wendy serves as a stay-at-home mom. The Deuel family also have two biological children at home.

"All our foster children have been reunited with their families except the child we adopted," she said. "The best part of fostering is building relationships with the biological families, because I think that connection is so important for the foster child to see. After the child leaves our home, we become a part of their extended family forever and we cherish that."



Wendy says that during COVID, they were encouraged to take on their first foster placement. "I actually had a Family Partnerships' child-welfare advocate contact me, who knew we had space, and encouraged us to take another child," she said.

For their selfless service, the Florida Department of Children and Families recognized them in 2025. "We're living our passion of helping children through a difficult time," said Wendy. "We know how important it is to give back and fill the void for these children who are often lonely and confused when they enter the foster system. They've been blessings in our lives, and I encourage other families to open their homes to foster children."

Family Partnerships of Central Florida awards new case management contracts in Orange and Seminole Counties; renews contract in Osceola

Going into its second year of serving as the lead child-welfare agency for four Central Florida counties, Family Partnerships of Central Florida has modified its partner team providing dependency case management services in the counties it serves.

Family Allies, the in-house case management team for Family Partnerships, is continuing services for Brevard County.

In Seminole County, Family Partnerships awarded Thompson Child & Family Focus to provide case management services under a three-year contract, with a start date of Sept. 15, 2025. In Orange County, Camelot Community Care was awarded a three-year contract starting in August 2025. In Osceola, Gulf Coast Jewish Family Community Services was awarded a three-year contract on Sept. 1, 2025 to continue case management services for Family Partnerships.

"We're excited to work with all these outstanding community partners who provide invaluable services to foster children and families," said Christopher Goncalo, Family Partnerships director of Contracts and Compliance. He noted that each of the three-year contracts come with one-year renewal options after the initial award period.

Phil Scarpelli, Family Partnerships chief executive officer and president, said caseworkers are the frontline staff who provide the most direct connections to protecting children and strengthening families, noting that attraction and retention of caseworker talent is a priority for the state and Central Florida.

"These partner organizations are part of our extended child-welfare family, professionals who give of themselves on a daily basis to help the most vulnerable population. It's one of the most noble callings in our world," he said.
